

## Class 1

1. You must be at least 15 years old to start driver's education and get a permit.
2. How to get your permit:
  - a. Fill out the pre-application at [www.dol.wa.gov](http://www.dol.wa.gov) → License Express → Join now → license express for individuals
  - b. Call 360.892.6988 - give the driving school your WDL number
  - c. Log back into to License Express - Apply for your permit online & pay \$25
3. Keep a DRIVE LOG (on paper or use a phone app).
4. While practicing driving with your permit, you will need a licensed driver with 5+ years of experience, seated next to you in the front passenger seat of the vehicle.
5. Car Seat Laws-
  - Rear facing until age 2
  - 5-piece harness until 4+ years old
  - Booster seat until 4' 9"
  - Backseat until 13 years old
6. Drivers ed includes: 5 hours behind the wheel, 4 hours defensive driving simulation, and 30 hours of classroom time.
7. You drive with an instructor once per month for 5 months. Practice 10 hours between drives.
8. WA State Law requires us to take Roll 3 times each class; Our instructor will initiate contact with Zoom attendees, and we must get the requested response from each student in the allotted (given) time frame for a student to get credit for class attendance.
9. If you miss the check-in time for your first attendance, you will have to make up the whole first hour of class. As for missing the 2nd and/or 3rd attendance, you will have to make up the whole 2nd hour of class.
10. If you need to cancel a drive, you must cancel by 12 PM (Noon), the business day before the drive. Otherwise, it will cost \$60 to reschedule.
11. To get your license when ready, you must meet these requirements:
  - Have held your permit for 6 months
  - Be at least 16 years of age
  - Have practiced 50 hours of driving with a licensed driver
  - Graduate a WA state drive school
  - Have had no tickets
  - Bring a parent/guardian with you
12. You will need to pass 4 tests to get your driver license:  
100 question- final exam with DRVN101 (Class #15)  
Drive 5- final drive with DRVN101 to finish drivers Ed  
40 Question DOL- State Written Exam (\$25) (you come back to driving school in order to take this test after you have finished drivers ed)  
30 min DOL issued Driving Exam \$40 (you can schedule this drive after you complete the DOL Written Exam)
13. you apply for your license, the DOL will charge you a \$35 application fee + \$54 for a Regular License, or \$78 for an Enhanced Driver License).
14. The Intermediate License requires/states that:  
For the first 6 months, you cannot drive from 1-5 AM (Morning)  
You cannot have people in the vehicle with you- Except for immediate family members (Parents and Siblings only)  
After the first 6-month mark of having your license, you can have up to 3 friends in the vehicle with you  
Once you are 18 years old, your license automatically becomes a regular license
15. Once licensed, if you receive a ticket, you will receive a (DOL) warning letter and must pay a fine. If you get a second ticket, your license will be suspended for 6 months along with another fine.
16. The Zoom link for class will be the same throughout the entirety of your driver's ed course. If you do a make-up class, you be emailed a second Zoom link in advance.

# SHARE ROAD

## RULES FOR MOTORISTS

*Using Washington's roads requires care and courtesy whether you are driving a car or riding a bicycle. Washington law requires every driver to respect the rights of others to be on the road. You can do your part by being a safe and courteous driver every time you get behind the wheel. Share The Road.*



Bicyclists and motorists in Washington have exactly the same rights and responsibilities. As a motorist, you should drive carefully around bicyclists. In some areas, bicycling is very popular and you may encounter groups of bicyclists. It is legal for bicyclists in Washington to ride two abreast (RCW 46.61.77). However, bicyclists must

show courtesy and not impede other road users. Some of the roads that are popular with bicyclists have curves, blind corners and uphill: be aware that you might suddenly come across a single rider or a group of bicyclists on scenic roads and drive accordingly. Here are some tips to more safely share the road with bicyclists:



Reduce your speed when passing bicyclists, especially if the roadway is narrow.

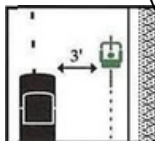
Don't blast your horn when approaching bicyclists - you could startle them and cause an accident.



Give bicyclists adequate space to maneuver around such hazards as lowered drain grates, potholes, debris and glass. These might not be a problem for a motor vehicle but are potentially dangerous to bicyclists.

Yield on left turns to oncoming bicyclists. Bicyclists may be traveling faster than you realize. Yield to bike riders as you would any other vehicle.

Pass with at least 3 feet to spare. Ample space between your vehicle and the bicyclist you are passing creates a zone for the bicyclist that's safe from the effects of a passing car.



Look before you open a car door. Bicyclists are often hit by unthinking motorists and passengers who open their car doors without looking carefully. Be sure you check for bicyclists before you open your door.



Provide extra passing room to bicyclists during rain and other bad weather.



Wait to pass if you are uncertain about road or weather conditions.

Allow for the inexperience of children on bicycles. Extra care is needed when near kids on bikes. Make sure you anticipate the unexpected turn or swerve.



Do not pass bicyclists if oncoming traffic is near. Wait as you would with any slow-moving vehicle. It's required by state law [RCW 46.61.77].

Check before you move back into your lane. Some bicyclists may be traveling at a slower speed. Make sure you provide adequate distance between you and the bicyclists before merging back into your travel lane.



NOTE: On roads that are too narrow to permit a bicycle and a car to safely share a lane, bicyclists are permitted to "take the travel lane" which means riding in the center of the travel lane.

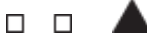
